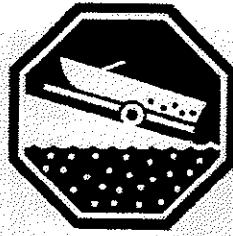
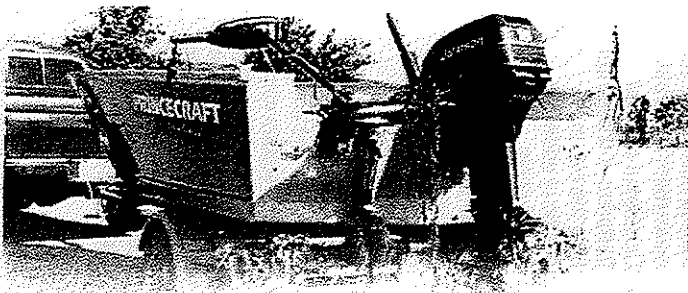

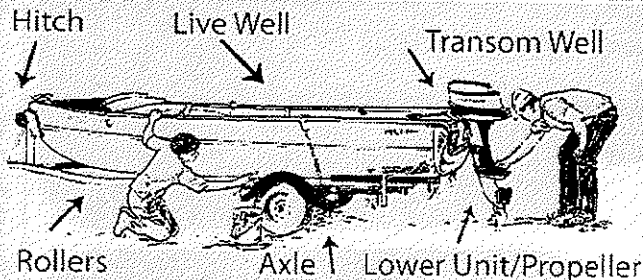

CLEAN BOATS CLEAN WATERS

Watch out for unwanted aquatic hitchhikers when you move from one waterway to another!

Aquatic invasive species (AIS) are non-native plants and animals that threaten native plants, wildlife, and their habitat. They also affect humans by degrading boating and fishing areas and reducing lake shore property values and tourism. Once AIS are established, eradication is almost impossible.

WATERCRAFT CHECK POINTS



When you leave a waterway:

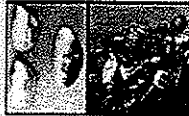
- Check and remove any visible mud, plants, fish or organisms from boats, trailers, equipment, clothing, dogs, etc.
- Clean and eliminate water from equipment.
- Dry anything that comes into contact with water.

Never release plants, fish, or other animals into a waterway unless they came from that waterway.

Aquatic Invaders to Look Out For:



- Water Chestnut**
- Triangular leaves & toothed edges
 - Forms dense floating mats
 - Seeds & plants attach to trailers



- Zebra/Quagga Mussel**
- Tiny, "D" or oval shaped striped shells
 - Covers hard surfaces & sharp shells cut feet
 - Shells attach to plants & boat bottoms



- Eurasian Watermilfoil**
- Feathery leaves in whorls of 4
 - Forms dense beds
 - Plant fragments attach to boats & trailers



- Spiny Waterflea**
- Tiny, 1/2" crustacean with long, barbed tail
 - Competes with fish for food
 - Masses collect on fishing line

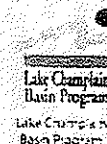


- Hydrilla**
- Blade-like leaves in whorls of 4-8
 - Forms dense beds
 - Plant fragments attach to boats & trailers



- Live Bait**
- Non-native crayfish and minnows
 - Alters aquatic habitats & may carry pathogens
 - Often released or illegally stocked

The Watershed Stewardship Program (WSP) is a collaborative education program offered at water access sites in the Adirondack and Champlain regions to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species and help preserve the integrity of water resources and local economies.



ATTENTION BOATERS AND FISHERMEN!!!!

Please **do your part to keep the water ways of the Town pristine** and free of invasive plants for recreation and enjoyment. The Town now provides a **FREE** service to wash your boats and trailers to keep them free of aquatic invasive species. The high temperature wash can remove nuisance plants like milfoil, spiny water flea, water chestnuts, and others. These organisms can hitch hike in bilge and bait wells, motors, boat surfaces, and trailers. The service will check boats, jet skis, kayaks, canoes and trailers and wash them if needed for free.

LOCATION: The station is conveniently located across the street from the Town Hall on Routes 10/29A.

DATES OF OPERATION: Memorial Day Weekend-Labor Day

HOURS: Weekends and Holidays: 7am-7pm. Monday-Thursday: 8 am-6 pm

Free visual inspections of boats and trailers are provided for all boats launched at the West Lake Boat Launch (8-5 weekdays and 6-6 on weekends).

These services are provided free through a partnership between Town of Caroga and Canada Lakes Conservation Association. Support is also provided through matching grants from the NYS Department of Conservation and Department of State.

SINGLESTREAM RECYCLING



All Recyclable Items Mix Together in One Bin for Collection

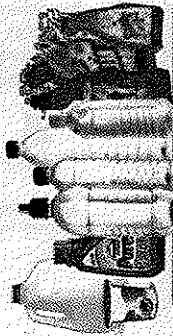
1. All recyclable items – paper, cardboard, plastic, metal and glass – need to be mixed together loosely in one bin.
2. Lids and labels should be left on recyclable containers, which should be empty and rinsed before recycling.
3. Recyclables must be placed in your designated recycling bin (a durable, lidded, plastic or metal container of your choice, 35 gallon maximum), marked with a sticker. More than one recycling bin is OK.
4. Do not place recyclables in plastic bags for collection (*shredded paper is the only exception*). No string, no bags, no trash allowed.

PAPER

- Newspaper & Inserts
 - Junk Mail, Circulars, Magazines & Catalogs
 - Phonebooks & Paperbacks
 - Brown Grocery Bags
 - Lightweight & Corrugated Cardboard
 - Beverage Cartons (Milk, Juice, and Juice boxes)
- DO NOT INCLUDE**
- Hardcover books, Paper plates
 - Napkins, Tissues, Construction paper
 - Soda & Beer Cartons



PLASTIC

- Plastic Bottles & Containers (Nursing Containers, Squeeze Milk & Water jugs)
 - Cottage Cheese, Yogurt & Filling Cup Containers
 - Soap & Detergent Containers
- DO NOT INCLUDE**
- Styrofoam containers, Plastic bags
 - Motor oil bottles, Clothes hangers
 - Toys, Prescription pill bottles



METAL

- Food & Beverage Cans
 - Deposit Cans
 - Aluminum Plates & Trays
 - Aluminum Foil (clean)
 - Aerosol Cans (empty)
 - Metal lids
- DO NOT INCLUDE**
- Metal cardboard containers (soda box)
 - Clothes hangers, Silverware, Pans
 - Ceramic appliances



GLASS

- Clear, Green & Amber Containers
 - Canning Jars
 - Deposit Bottles
 - Liquor & Wine Bottles
 - Food & Beverage Containers
- DO NOT INCLUDE**
- Broken glass, Drinking glasses
 - Overware, Appliances, Dishware, Mirrors
 - Window glass or light bulbs

- Other Tips**
- Step on milk jugs, detergent bottles, etc., to make room in the bin.
 - Cardboard must be flattened. If it does not fit in the bin, put it beside or under the recycling bin.
 - Curbside recycling should be out by 6 a.m. the day of pickup or put out the night before.
 - 50 pound limit on recycling bins. You can use more than one bin.
 - Transfer station users can transport recycling in any type of container and then must dump it loose into singlestream recycling container at the station.

ONE EXCEPTION TO THE "NO BAG" RULE: SHREDDED PAPER – Tie up in a clear plastic bag. Put the bag in with loose recyclables.
